Of the many things I've learned since moving to Kansas, I'd put up at the top that I know I cannot predict the date spring flowers will bloom here! Last year we had a really late spring, and well into April, everything bloomed at once! Some years, things bloom in fits and starts. This year, we have had some very early warm days – followed by a strong cold snap – and flowers which began to bloom way too early been blooming much longer than they normally bloom.

Spring is hard to predict. New life pushes to the sun through the earth – but the possibility of death through freeze is ever present. The average last day for a freeze here is April 20. That's three weeks away. We might enjoy blooms – we might plant our seeds – we might reap an early harvest – or it might freeze. We never know.

And yet we have great hope each spring. We hope for bountiful harvests and bins full of onions and garlic. We think on fragrant smells of basil and parsley. The way the Easter story happens is totally unexpected. If we read through the accounts in all four gospels, we would never predict the ending. So many occurrences in our world lead us to expect the worst. Often we've grown accustomed to terrible things happening in our lives. Perhaps we've become callous to oppression and suffering in other's lives. Easter reminds us that the unexpected can and does happen. The ending we've come to expect does not need to control us.

Take a look around for signs of newness. Listen for new bird songs, look for new flowers, and experience new ideas and visions. Easter is a time to open ourselves to hope and joy. Hope and joy always bring newness and freshness. Let us open our hearts and take time to revel in the joy of the Easter season.

11 Facts About Easter

- 1. Easter is the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ in the Christian religion.
- 2. Eggs have been seen as ancient symbol of fertility, while springtime is considered to bring new life and rebirth.
 - Americans spend \$1.9 billion on Easter candy. That's the second biggest candy holiday after Halloween.
 70% of Easter candy purchased is chocolate.
 - 5. 76% of Americans think the ears of a chocolate bunny should be the first to be eaten.
 - 6. Egg dyes were once made out of natural items such as onion peels, tree bark, flower petals, and juices.
- There's much debate about the practice of dyeing chicks. Many hatcheries no longer participate, but others say
 that it isn't dangerous to the chick's health because the dye only lasts until the chicks shed their fluff and grow
 their feathers.
 - 8. The first story of a rabbit (later named the "Easter Bunny") hiding eggs in a garden was published in 1680.
- 9. Easter takes place on a Sunday, after the 40-day period called Lent. Lent is referred to as a time of fasting, but participants focus more on giving up one significant indulgence.
- 10. Holy Week is the celebrated during the week leading up to Easter. It begins on Palm Sunday, continues on to Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and then finally, Easter Sunday.
- 11. "The White House Easter Egg Roll" event has been celebrated by the President of the United States and their families since 1878.




