

STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE

Quick Notes from your Stewardship and Finance

Just a reminder that we are still collecting Per Capita donations. This year the Per Capita amount is \$37 per person. Most of this stays at the Presbytery of Northern Kansas, while some flows up to the Synod and some to General Assembly. Please put "Per Capita" in the memo line of your check.

Pledge donations are running behind by 10-15% through February. Anything you can do to get your pledge current is appreciated.

Jessica Martin of the Greater Salina Community Foundation (GSCF) did a wonderful job of leading our educational workshop "Leaving a Legacy, Ways to Give" We did video it, so if anyone is interested in seeing it, please contact Dave Parks.

Our quarterly gain on our GSCF endowment fund was \$30,133.65 for the 4th quarter of 2023. The growth of the endowment fund keeps being a benefit to Sunrise. Many thanks to those who had the foresight to start it and to all of you who continue to contribute to it. Contributions can be made at any time of the year. Only those made on March 21 are eligible for the matching.

Way to go Sunrise! We collected \$1,490 for the Souper Bowl of Hope Project. There is still time to donate before Karmel sends this money on.

A 3% (of annual wages) lump sum payment was made to all Sunrise employees at the end of February. This is in lieu of a permanent annual wage increase. We wanted ot show our appreciation for our hard-working staff.



Souper Bowl of Hope was a huge success again this year. Thank you to all who donated or helped collect the soup. Sunrise donated \$1490 to Souper Bowl of Hope.

Project Salina will kick off on April 18 with a meeting at Sunrise. Food or money donations will continue into May. You will be hearing more about this from Paul McAfee.

The lingerie shower for the women at Ashby House and CKF will be in April. Please leave your donations in the lingerie cabinet in the church foyer. Money donations are also welcome.

On March 16 members of the Mission committee traveled to Ellsworth to tour the Family Connections Center. It is a mission of the non profit organization that provide low cost accommodations for families visiting inmates at the Ellsworth Correctional Facility.

The Pentecost offering will be collected May 5-19, 2024.

The CASTLE board appreciates your response to the virtual pancake breakfast fundraiser. \$880 was collected to help fund the program which will be June 3 to July 19 this year. One hour after the registration was opened we had 102 children registered! That is a new record.

AGENCY OF THE MONTH Church World Service

PRESBYTERIANS WORK TOGETHER WITH CHURCH WORLD SERVICE

In early January of 2023, the rain began to fall on the rural farming village of Planada, California. Normally, this type of rain would be a welcome relief to this arid community. Except the rain did not stop. More than three inches fell in a very brief time—significantly more than the town's drainage systems could handle. The rising waters ultimately breached Miles Creek sending a tidal wave of water down upon this small community of mostly migrant farm workers. More than fifty percent of Planada's homes were damaged or destroyed. The local elementary school incurred so much damage that it would remain closed for months. The agriculture fields that were the foundation of the region's economy instantly became useless swampland. Experts estimated that more than 83% of the residents suffered a substantial economic loss due to the flooding. Like the dark clouds that brought the rain, fear and despair hovered over the community.

Enter into this picture Alicia Perez of the St. Vincent de Paul Society of Planada. Ms. Perez realized the vulnerable state that these families were facing. Since English was not the native language for most, navigating governmental assistance was both intimidating and overwhelming. Perez immediately contacted Church World Service for support. CWS provided hygiene kits, school kits and cleanup buckets to aid in the recovery. "The children felt very happy to receive the school kits," Perez reported. "So many of them had just lost their Christmas gifts and the new school supplies were the only thing they owned that was not wet or destroyed." During a time when uncertainty was rising, kits from Church World Service offered a glimmer of hope.

Whether it be cleanup buckets sent to hurricane ravaged communities or welcome backpacks sent to welcome our new neighbors or school kits sent to Planada, California, Church World Service Kits provide glimmers of hope to people who feel as if the darkness has overtaken them. So on this day when we consider our involvement in the Church World Service kit ministry program, may we be that sparkle of hope and may we remember the words of the writer of book of Hebrews, "do not forget to do good and to share with those in need."


